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The winners of Middle East University's literary competition talk about reading and how it shapes character





Amman: Three winners of the first and second seasons of the Dr. Yacoub Nasereddin Award for Free Reading and Creative Writing spoke to Middle East University students during a dialogue session entitled "Zad Al-Nuha" about the impact of reading on character formation and building and its strong positive impact on empowering the skills of writing and speaking in those who accept and master them.

This came during a meeting organised by the award committee, headed by the Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Educational Sciences, Prof. Ahmed Musa, moderated by the award committee member and cultural club advisor, Dr. Jumana Al-Salem, and attended by a number of faculty members at the faculty, students of the Arabic Language Department, and members of the cultural club.

The following were the participants in the session:

The winners of the first and second seasons were, respectively, Sarah Atri, a student from Zarqa University, and Loujain Sabah, a student from Princess Sumaya University. Rawaa Abu Bakr, a student from Middle East University, came in third place in the second season. Additionally, Mayar Al-Duwairi and Marh Al-Duwairi, students from Yadouda Secondary School for Girls, have repeatedly won the Arab Reading Challenge competitions and excelled in writing short stories and essays.

During the session, held in cooperation with the Cultural Club at the university's Deanship of Student Affairs, participants reviewed the role of universities in enhancing this skill. They praised the Dr. Yacoub Nasereddin Award, which they received after a series of interviews and impartial professional procedures. The award serves as a starting point for them to continue reading purposefully and responsibly, which opens horizons for them towards sound language skills and sober thought, expression, and performance. This is one of the most important objectives of the award, which achieved remarkable success in its first (2021–2022) and second (2022–2023) seasons.

The competition is currently in the judging phase for entries submitted in its third season, covering free reading, essay writing, and short story writing.

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he Governorate of Giza honours the Middle East University football team for winning the championship cup.



Amman: The Governor of the District of Giza, Mr. Nasser Shawabkeh, honoured the Middle East University football team after winning the Ministry of Youth's Five-a-side Football Championship, held at the Talibiya Club in the District of Giza.

The university team presented an exceptional performance that attracted the attention of the participants and provided an idea of the type of training facilities provided by the university for the team members from the university students, as the university had inaugurated a professional football field, according to FIFA standards and regulations, with a longitudinal area of 90 metres and a cross section of 45 metres.

Regarding the university team's tournament results, they won four matches: defeating Al-Ghahabi team 30-, defeating Umm Al-Rasas team 32-, defeating Talibiya Union team 116- in the semi-finals, and ultimately defeating Al-Faisali team 42- in the final round at the District of Giza level.



Middle East University innovates a new approach to teaching scientific research methods in universities.

Amman: A major scientific achievement at Middle East University has pioneered a new approach to teaching scientific research methods, called the "integrative method." "The Integrative Method," a method that relies on the importance of a thorough comprehension of the relationships between the parts of the subject, contributes to building a comprehensive picture that achieves a deeper comprehension of the Media Research Methods course.

The scientific achievement is attributed to Dr. Laila Jarrar, a faculty member at the University's Faculty of Media, who explained in her study published in the Journal of Studies in Humanities and Social Sciences: Humanities and Social Sciences, which is classified in the international database Scopus, that the "integrative method" achieved very positive results in terms of ease, understanding, and enjoyment, which emphasises the importance of this innovation and its impact on the development of the edia esearch curriculum in Jordanian universities.

The new approach to teaching Media Research Methods is based on nine (9) stages, which will assist the students to better and more effectively understand the principles of Media Research and apply them to the real world.

The study titled "The degree of effectiveness of the integrative method in teaching the media research methods course" is a descriptive study that relied on the survey method and performance evaluation of the research plans of 84 male and female students studying the media research methods course at the College of Media at the Middle East University. It was published in the Journal of Studies. The University of Jordan's Humanities and Social Sciences has been classified within the international databases (SCOPUS Q4) in Volume 51, Issue 1 of 2024.

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A leading architectural magazine publishes unique architectural projects by students from Middle East University.





Amman: ACS Architecture in Creative Space Magazine has published projects for a number of students from the Faculty of Architecture and Design at Middle East University, demonstrating the advanced level of the university's students in understanding and accommodating the challenges of modern society and its architectural requirements. The projects of Mohammed Moussa, Dina Al-Nazer, and Lian Blue have been included in visitor centres for archaeological sites in the Ain Ghazal area, as well as in reconstruction projects and concepts, such as the reconstruction of the displaced village of Al Dawaima in Hebron.

According to Dr. Shaden Abu Safiya, supervisor of the projects and head of the Department of Architecture, the students' projects have made significant contributions to the field of architecture, as evidenced by their publication in prominent architectural magazines.

The students themselves noted that exposure to diverse design methods and contextual challenges broadened their architectural horizons and encouraged critical thinking on the role of architecture in shaping society.

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Students from Middle East University bring their architectural ideas to life in a 27-dunum project, which is an ambitious initiative.





Amman: An architectural project designed by the students of the Faculty of Architecture and Design at the Middle East University embodied exceptional ideas that reflected the quality of the applied programmes offered by the faculty on the one hand and the architectural intelligence of the students on the other hand.

The Circassian Charitable Society developed the project, which is situated on a 27-dunam land area on Mecca Street in Amman. Its significance lies in generating financial returns that benefit several impoverished families and needy students.

In this respect, the supervisors of the proposed commercial/residential project, faculty member Walaa Al-Qarra and her assistant laboratory supervisor, Engineer Mohammed Khrisat, stated that the project was approached with seriousness throughout the semester. The design principles and standards adhered to building regulations and laws, with integrated engineering, structural, and mechanical systems.


The students in interior architecture design were supervised by faculty member Doaa Al-Sanada. The project involved designing apartments, clinics, and shops to achieve comprehensive integration between the courses of fourth-year architecture students.

He stated that a degree is not necessary for a career in cinema, but rather that practical knowledge is key. Cinema is a complex field, and university students may lack focus, especially given the uncertainty surrounding the potential for Jordanian productions to make significant advancements. It is important to avoid falling into the trap of stereotyping or limiting ideas.

Prof. Dr. Al-Mahadeen emphasised the university's interest in being a reference for all emerging trends in new cinema, pointing out that it is time to put things into perspective, especially with the launch of diploma programmes in modern cinema, as we are faced with a job market that does not only seek degree holders but also holders of ideas that are ahead of their time.

She explained that the university's study plans align with its sense of responsibility to provide students with the necessary resources to develop their talents and achieve their goals.

In the same context, Dr. Hanan Al-Sheikh said that the university's strategy is in line with the vision of His Majesty King Abdullah II bin Al-Hussein, who is firmly committed to giving Jordanian cinema the status it deserves, which is reflected in the design and photography labs and film effects rooms in the new building of the faculty.

Amman: Middle East University and the Royal Jordanian Hashemite Documentation Centre (RJDC) signed a collaboration agreement at the centre's headquarters inside the Royal Hashemite Court. This agreement establishes a comprehensive training programme comprising diploma programmes and specialised training courses in several fields, including archival sciences, documentation, and conservation.

The meeting was attended by the Acting Director General of the Centre, Ms. Reham Al-Masri; the Director of the Technical and Studies Department, Mr. Sulaiman Al-Shugairat; and the Director of the Consultancy, Training, and Languages Centre, Prof. Anis Al-Mansour. In addition, the Centre's delegation was also in attendance.

In this context, Ms. Al-Masri defined the role of archiving as one that preserves history and enables future generations to access knowledge. She also noted that the importance of archiving has increased in the current era, where events are unfolding rapidly and information is spreading at a high pace. She emphasised the necessity of developing standards and strategies for digital preservation, addressing issues such as format obsolescence and data integrity. This can be achieved by leveraging advanced tools for metadata creation and retrieval.

In the view of Prof. Al-Mansour, the diploma course will provide students with a multifaceted learning experience. This will include exposure to the technological advances that shape contemporary archival practices and the ethical considerations inherent in archival work. Furthermore, the course will include case studies drawn from RDC's extensive holdings, providing students with real-world examples to analyse and interpret. In addition, fieldwork assignments and collaboration with archivists on projects to digitise and catalogue archival materials will be included.

Middle East University hosts the fourth edition of the Jordanian Science Olympiad Examination.





Amman: Middle East University hosted the third stage of the fourth edition of the Jordanian Science Olympiad Examination, with its multiple fields in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Economics, Entrepreneurship, Astronomy, and Space.

The university's decision to host the Olympiad reflects its conviction that a knowledge-generating institution must be at the forefront of scientific discovery and innovation and that it has a responsibility to empower the next generation of leaders in the field of science and technology.

A total of 6,790 students participated in the initial phase of the Olympiad, resulting in 1,370 students advancing to the third phase. The fourth and final phase of the Olympiad was also held at Middle East University, with 75 students from the districts of Amman, Marka, and Naour taking the exam.

It is also worth mentioning that the Jordanian Cultural Scientific Talent Association, in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Culture, the Abu-Ghazaleh Global Foundation, and the Jordanian Astronomical Society, as well as the Scientific Olympiad, launched the Olympiad.

Amman: The First International Conference on Humanities: Challenges and Opportunities, held at the Middle East University, was officially launched under the auspices of the Chairman of the University's Board of Trustees, Senator Dr. Yacoub Nasereddin, in the presence of the University's President, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadin, Vice President of the Board of Directors, Dr. Ahmad Nasereddin, college deans, faculty members, and a gathering of students.

It is worth noting that the conference is organised by the Faculty of Arts and Educational Sciences and will be held until Tuesday, April 30, 2024, at the university campus. It will involve the participation of dozens of researchers and academics from several countries, namely Jordan, Palestine, Saudi Arabia, Oman, and Egypt.

In this respect, Dr. Nasereddin emphasised that this conference is a response to the vision of His Majesty King Abdullah II Bin Al-Hussein towards education, which for His Majesty is a national priority that requires a comprehensive review of curricula, methods, tools, and educational facilities. In particular, the university's strategy now aligns with His Majesty's seventh discussion paper, which asserts that nations cannot rise without education. This can be observed in the manner in which education serves to facilitate the development of countries towards a knowledge economy, as well as in its role in the investment of human energies.

He clarified that the time has come to reform the educational paths in dealing with the challenges imposed on us by contemporary human civilisation about the true value of the human being in the world of technology, artificial intelligence, the fourth industrial revolution, and the complex changes in human relations within the family and society, pointing out that the values of education are an integral part of the principles of the state, which is base in determining its position on the current regional developments on the importance of realising the rights of its people, especially the rights of the Palestinian people, especially their right to self-determination and establishing their independent state on their land with Jerusalem as its capital, Al-Quds Al-Sharif.

According to the Head of the Scientific Committee of the conference, Vice Dean of the College of Arts and Educational Sciences, Prof. Dr. Mohammed Hamza, in the presence of the Dean of the College, Prof. Ahmed Moussa, the conference aims to investigate the challenges facing the humanities, promote knowledge integration between the different fields of the humanities, cope with the developments in the humanities, and adopt future visions that develop the humanities curricula and transform them into digital curricula.

In his address to the conference, delivered by the Head of the Department of Educational Technology, Dr. Ahmed Tabiya, he highlighted that the preparations for this conference commenced a year ago, with the themes and objectives being formulated by a scientific committee comprising 36 scientists and experts in various branches of the humanities from local and international universities.

Additionally, 34 papers were submitted by 61 male and female researchers, whose research will be published in journals classified within the Scopus rules.
