Amman: The Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Middle East University, Senator Dr. Yaqoub Nasereddin, in the presence of the President of the University, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadin, emphasised the significance of the message conveyed by the exhibition. The Faculty of Architecture and Design presented “Artistic Illuminations in Reconstruction,” which conveyed the tragedy of the brothers in Gaza in a way that prompted reflection on the noble positions of the Hashemite leadership. This leadership took upon itself the defence of rebuilding the international community’s perception of justice, rights, and stolen land.

He further highlighted that the projects showcased in the exhibition serve to illustrate the fact that a satisfactory quality of life will be restored to Gaza, particularly in light of the architectural dimension evident in the subway project, which evoked considerable admiration from the audience due to its innovative architectural design. This indicates that we are prepared to exert our utmost efforts to ensure that the rights of its people are upheld, particularly in light of the destruction of

infrastructure in Gaza resulting from the systematic and immoral targeting of residential buildings, schools, hospitals, roads, water and sewage systems, and electricity networks.

Speaking in the presence of faculty members and a gathering of students, the Dean of the Faculty, Dr. Ayman Awad, explicitly stated that the students’ works definitively confirm that the Gaza Strip was subject to injustice and humiliation in front of the international community without any action being taken. He further highlighted that the reconstruction process represents an opportunity to promote social and economic development and address long-standing grievances in the Gaza Strip.

The exhibition featured a selection of paintings that summarised the history of human rights violations in Gaza and demonstrated the importance of Gaza’s reconstruction process, which faces numerous challenges, including political obstacles, logistical issues, and environmental considerations.

The National Centre for Culture and Arts presents stories about society and reproductive health at Middle East University.



Amman: A theatrical performance presented by the National Centre for Culture and the Arts (NCCA) at Middle East University in the presence of deans, faculty members, and students addressed the topic of reproductive health issues and their intertwined relationship with societal norms, expectations, and judgments.

The performance is part of the National Centre's performing arts programme, which was established with the objective of increasing public awareness of critical social issues, including those pertaining to women's rights and human rights.

The performance provided an in-depth look at a number of societal issues, which may result in reluctance to resolve them due to fear of judgement, which may lead many to overlook early check-ups out of caution or urgent ones out of control and treatment.

The performance demonstrated that reluctance toward early detection of diseases can prevent individuals from seeking the necessary medical care or obtaining information about the necessary therapeutic interventions.

The performance emphasised that addressing societal issues requires creating safe spaces where people feel empowered to seek information, support, and care.

A training programme on workplace ethics has been successfully concluded at Middle East University.



Amman: A training programme on etiquette and work ethics was successfully concluded at Middle East University, with the participation of a number of representatives of the Royal Jordanian Hashemite Documentation Centre (RJDC).

The programme was organised by the Consultancy, Training, and Languages Centre and presented by Dana Juihan, a representative of Al-Rowad Academy for Consultancy and Training. It focused on a set of rules that tend to enhance the work environment, boost productivity, and build relationships.

The programme identified punctuality as a key factor in the perception of an individual's behaviours and ethics. It also highlighted the importance of appropriate and stylish attire in creating a positive first impression.

Furthermore, eye contact during social interaction serves to convey information that cannot be expressed verbally, such as the depth of interest in the conversation, which leaves a distinctive first impression.

The stadium joins other sports facilities that provide physical and mental stimulation for students to improve concentration, enhance academic performance, and build a mindset of perseverance, including gyms, fitness centres, indoor basketball, volleyball, and tennis courts.

Middle East University and the Regional Centre for Space Science and Technology Education launch a unique partnership path.



Amman: Middle East University and the Regional Centre for Space Science and Technology Education have signed a collaboration agreement to launch a unique partnership path focusing on a package of diploma programmes and specialised training courses in several fields, including Remote Sensing, Space Technology, Global Navigation systems, and more.

The agreement was signed by the President of the University, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadin, in the presence of the Vice President of the Board of Directors, Dr. Ahmad Nasereddin, and the Director General of the Centre, Brigadier Muammar Haddadin, in the presence of a delegation of experts from the Centre.

In this context, Brig. Gen. Haddadin, in the presence of the Director of Scientific Affairs and Training Dr. Hanna Sabat, Head of Training Department Dr. Qais Al-Omari, and Head of Academic Programs and Scientific Research Department Dr. Ammar Al-Sakji, asserted that a university degree is now meaningless if the graduate lacks creative and higher knowledge skills. He further noted that Middle East University has succeeded in this endeavour, which requires serious awareness and urgent awareness of labour market requirements, through optimal investment in its students.

In the presence of Vice President Prof. Ahmed Allouzi and Director of the Consultancy, Training, and Languages Centre Prof. Anis Al-Mansour, Dr. Nasereddin stated that the university adheres to the



vision of His Majesty King Abdullah II bin Al Hussein regarding collaboration between the public and private sectors. This is with the objective of stimulating economic mobility and activating a partnership on programmatic grounds within a clear framework aimed at improving the construction of a knowledge economy and investing human energies.

Prof. Al-Mahadin identified the university's primary objective as benchmarking its cognitive and academic standing relative to its peers. She asserted that the traditional view of accreditations as mere certificates on the wall is no longer sufficient. Instead, the focus should be on the university's contributions to the quality and advancement of the learning process, rather than on the number of accreditations.

Students from the Faculty of Law at Middle East University interview the national security expert, Dr. Al-Nuaimat.



Amman: Students of the course “In-depth Study in Civil Law,” delivered by the Assistant to the President and faculty member at the Faculty of Law, Dr. Tamara Nasereddin, conducted an interview with Dr. Ahmad Al-Nuaimat, Head of the Media Response Unit at the National Center for Security and Crisis Management, regarding the civil liability of a website for damages resulting from published comments in accordance with Jordanian law.

The lecture identified the extent to which the general rules, the Press and Publication Law, and the Cybercrime Law are able to accommodate all cases imposed by the nature of the work of websites with regard to the comments posted by them. It also addressed the need to enact special legislation that regulates the work of these websites and provides solutions to all the issues imposed by the nature of their work.

The lecture focused on addressing the issues of civil liability for the website owner for comments with harmful content imposed by the new technology in its work, which often exceed the traditional limits of general civil liability rules.

“Drugs are a destructive agent of integrity,” as stated by the Public Security Directorate during a lecture at Middle East University.



Amman: An event presented by the Information and Community Police Directorate, in collaboration with the Anti-Narcotics Department, took place on the campus of Middle East University. It focused on the extended impact of drug use on the safety and security of the community system, as a society that is peaceful and pure provides a favourable environment for promoting physical and mental health.

The event was attended by the Vice President of the University, Prof. Ahmad Allouzi; the Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, Dr. Mahmoud Al-Duwairi; the Director of Information and Community Police Department, Colonel Mahmoud Al-Shiab; a representative of the Anti-Narcotics Department, Lieutenant Colonel Imad Al-Saqrat; and a group of officers and non-commissioned officers.

This was followed by a theatrical presentation by the Police Theatre Troupe of the Public Security Directorate, which addressed the role of drugs in deteriorating public health, increasing addiction rates, and exacerbating mental health disorders.

The performance demonstrated the catastrophic impact of drug use on public health, portraying it as a silent killer, a puppeteer behind the rising tide of addiction. With each scene, the layers of deception were revealed, exposing the deep wounds inflicted on individuals, families, and communities alike.

The theatre performance placed the audience in the position of the shattered dreams, which had caused life to deviate from its intended course, and presented drug addicts as a narrative of destructive pleasure and righteousness.

Middle East University attains second place in the 15th Arab Robotics Championship.



Amman: In the 15th Arab Robotics Championship, held in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Middle East University attained second place, with over 400 male and female participants representing 10 Arab countries.

The students who participated and represented the university in this project were Mohammed Aliwat, Muhannad Abu Sel, Anas Al-Sayed, Youssef Khader, and Mohammed Barham. They were supervised by Mr. Laith Al-Shehabk, a faculty member.

In this context, the Dean of the Faculty, Dr. Uday Al-Maaytah, in the presence of the faculty delegation, asserted that university students have articulated valuable insights regarding the concept of seriousness and commitment to achieve the desired change. This is evident in more than 20 male and female students who have chosen to be volunteers, organising the activities of the tournament under the supervision of the certified referee, Dr. Huzaifa Abu Hammad.

Furthermore, he observed that the students' 2nd-place achievement has facilitated the development of effective and sustainable collaborative pathways that align with their aspirations to become leaders and seekers of the new world.

Al-Khuraisha, speaking from Middle East University, stated: “The participation of youth and women must be effective, not nominal.”



Amman: Minister of Political and Parliamentary Affairs Haditha Al-Khuraisha called for voting and evaluating candidates for the elections scheduled for September 10 on the basis of their programmes rather than their personalities.

During a dialogue session organised by Middle East University on the environment for political and party work, the Chairman of the University's Board of Trustees, Senator Dr. Yaaoub Nasereddin, the President of the University, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadeen, and university students discussed the importance of involving women and youth in political and party work. They emphasised that these groups should not be merely formal participants but rather active agents of change, with the responsibility of promoting candidates with viable programmes.

The Minister underscored that legislation is supportive in principle of youth and women, but that it is ultimately up to the youth themselves and women to support themselves in the upcoming elections, whether in terms of candidacy or participation in voting. Responding to students' questions about holding elections in light of the security situation in the region, Al-Khuraisha said: "The implementation of the constitutional right to hold elections in light of the Israeli aggression on Gaza and the security situation in the region shows that the Jordanian state is serious about implementing its rights, and this is proof of the strength of the state's institutions."

Al-Khuraisha explained that the Jordanian state, under the leadership of His Majesty King Abdullah II, is firmly on the path of political modernisation, and that this path is irreversible because His Majesty is the first guarantor of these outputs, and the constitution is a key guarantor of these outputs, as it has fortified the election and party laws, as amendments to the articles of these laws can only be made in the presence of two-thirds of the members of the House of Representatives.

Al-Khuraisha addressed the students, stating: "It would be wise to direct our collective energies towards the path of joining programme parties that rely on programmes and implementable

plans, rather than the path of closed political salons."

The discussion papers of His Majesty King Abdullah II bin Al Hussein set forth a framework for a more inclusive, participatory, and accountable political system. The papers provided a framework for democratic reform, with a focus on the maturity of party politics as a crucial element in the country's political development, said Al-Khuraisha.

He pointed out that the importance of party work stems from our keenness to complete the new Jordan project in its second centennial, which we would not have reached with our high aspirations towards a Jordan that we deserve and deserves us, except with democratic principles that respect pluralism, encourage active and positive participation, and are based on clear programme paths away from what we have experienced from tribal, regional, and tribal loyalties.

In a dialogue session moderated by the Dean of Student Affairs, Dr. Ayman Al-Khazaleh, the Minister, outlined that serious and genuine political parties should not be mere tools to achieve personal ambitions or tribal interests. Rather, they should evolve into institutions that develop clear political programmes and solutions to national challenges. He indicated that the party project is fully aware of the Jordanian demographic, as it calls for the involvement of youth in the political decision-making process. This is because they are the ones who shape our future and must work for it by expressing their aspirations and then defending them for the benefit of the nation.

An extensive dialogue was held between the students and Minister Al-Khuraisha on the steps taken to ensure that the elections are free, fair, transparent, and influential, the main challenges in implementing electoral reforms, the aspirations of the Jordanian people regarding political and economic development, how these reforms are compatible with the electoral process, and the measures taken to ensure that the reforms continue and are not neglected or undone by future governments.

Middle East University plays host to the Arab Universities Governance Council, which convenes to explore the forthcoming phase.



A recent meeting was held at which the Secretary General of the Union of Arab Universities, Prof. Amr Salameh, the Secretary General of the Arab Universities Governance Council (AUGC), the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Middle East University, Senator Dr. Yaqoub Nasereddin, the President of the Council, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadeen, and the Director of the Arab Universities Governance Council, Prof. Mohammed Al-Haila, discussed the application of governance principles and indicators to enhance the quality of Arab universities, disseminate the culture of digital governance, and cultivate executive capabilities.

The meeting centred on the significance of developing governance models to oversee the alterations affecting university education and its knowledge structure. This is occurring concurrently with the perception of universities as knowledge generators, promoters of advancement, and drivers of sustainability.

The meeting, which was attended by Prof. Mouawad Mohammed Al-Khouli, President of New Mansoura University, Prof. Tariq Al-Qurum, Vice President of Al-Zaytuna University, Prof. Hussein Shank, President of Palestine Technical University-Khodouri, and Prof. Hussein Shank, President of Warith Al-Anbiya University, Prof. Ibrahim Said Al-Hayawi, President of the Open University of Libya, and His Excellency Professor Abulgasim Shalouf, emphasised the role of governance in supporting entrepreneurship initiatives, promoting partnerships with industry, and contributing to the development of a knowledge-based economy.

Amman: Students of the course “Labour Law and Social Security,” delivered by the Assistant President of Middle East University, a faculty member at the Faculty of Law, Prof. Tamara Nasereddine, engaged in a discussion with the lawyer and legal consultant in charge of the “Know Your Rights” initiative, Prof. Amani Al-Jaabari, regarding the methods of substantiating labour contracts before the court and the invalid terms of labour contracts according to the Jordanian Labour Law.

The lecture focused on labour law and social security as the cornerstones of the employer-employee relationship, as they comprise a wide range of regulations designed to protect workers’ rights and ensure fair and equitable treatment in the workplace.

Moreover, the lecture explained that proving the existence of employment contracts is key to ensuring the enforcement of labour rights in the event of legal disputes and that it is essential to know the conditions that render employment contracts invalid, such as clauses that violate labour laws, public order, or fundamental rights.

Significantly, Dr. Al-Tarawneh has a substantial body of published work, including numerous research papers and articles that have been peer-reviewed and published in scientific journals.

The Faculty of Media at Middle East University organises a conference on science journalism, which will be attended by a number of experts from six different countries.



Amman: Middle East University's Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Senator Dr. Yaqoub Nasereddin, has stated that the conference is occurring at a time when the world is witnessing climate change that requires immediate action. Furthermore, the university is fully cognizant of the significance of its role as an educational institution, with a strategy aligned with the vision of His Majesty King Abdullah II Ibn Al Hussein, who views Jordan as a regional hub for green development with the objective of safeguarding the environment and mitigating the impact of climate change.

This occurred during his patronage of the conference, entitled "The Reality of Scientific Journalism in Jordan," which was organized by the Faculty of Media at the University. The conference brought together deans of media faculties in Jordan as well as academics and researchers from

media colleges and institutes in six countries: Jordan, Palestine, Morocco, Lebanon, Yemen, and the United Kingdom.

Dr. Nasereddin further asserted that the current era calls for the emergence of authentic scientific journalism grounded in scientific principles, particularly in view of the prevalence of personal opinions on social media that often deviate from logical reasoning. In her address, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadin, President of the University, emphasised the value of the conference as a forum for communication and collaboration between journalists, scientists, and stakeholders. She highlighted the need for a more realistic approach to the coverage of scientific issues, which are often perceived as mere luxuries rather than necessities. She also acknowledged the rapid evolution of the media landscape with the emergence of new technologies and platforms.

Dr. Hanan Al-Sheikh, Dean of the Faculty of Media, stated that interest in scientific journalism remains limited. The news is limited to partial coverage of events and a seasonal review of achievements, with a focus on environmental, technological, and health topics only and not other fields. This is particularly evident in the absence of specialised journalism departments and crews, the scarcity of specialised journalists, and the reliance on foreign international news agencies and magazines without consideration of local contexts.

The conference provided a roadmap to enhance the quality and impact of science journalism, which serves as a medium linking the needs of science with human aspirations. In particular, journalists play a pivotal role in shaping a vibrant and engaging discourse on climate change and the environment.

Middle East University recommends launching a specialised journalistic platform during a conference on the reality of science journalism in Jordan.



Amman: The Faculty of Media at Middle East University concluded the conference, entitled ‘The Reality of Science Journalism in Jordan’, with the participation of deans of media faculties in Jordan, as well as academics and researchers from media colleges and institutes in six countries: Jordan, Palestine, Morocco, Lebanon, Yemen, and the United Kingdom.

The conference, which was presided over by the Chairman of the University’s Board of Trustees, Senator Dr. Yaqoub Nasereddin, and attended by the University’s President, Prof. Salam Al-Mahadin, recommended the launching of a journalistic platform that serves as a centre for high-quality scientific journalism, promoting informed public discourse on its multiple tracks, and the introduction of a specialised scientific journalism course in Jordan’s faculties of media.

Furthermore, the recommendations included the prioritisation and development of specialised scientific programmes, which will facilitate the advancement of societal knowledge towards technological progress and artificial intelligence. Additionally, the Jordan Press Association and

local and international bodies based in Jordan were encouraged to qualify and train a number of working media professionals and to build their capacities in specialised journalism, with a particular focus on science journalism.

Supporting the above, the conference recommended the organisation of scientific competitions prepared by universities through their specialised departments and the invitation of researchers and those interested in media and scientific journalism to conduct further studies on the role of traditional and digital media in awareness-raising, health, religious, and educational perspectives.

The conference highlighted the pivotal role of science journalism in reflecting and shaping the realities of modern society. By promoting scientific culture, influencing policy, driving economic growth, and shaping cultural values, science journalism, in its capacity as a social and cultural institution, not only reflects the realities of modern society but also shapes them.
